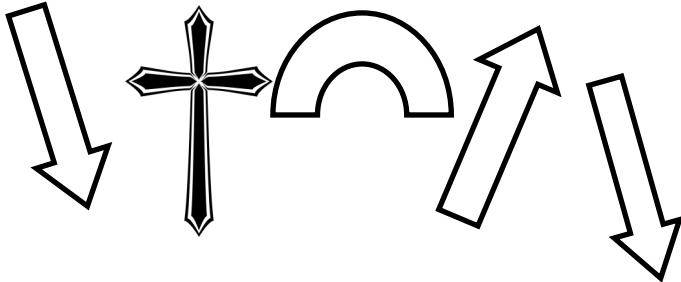

ALL Means ALL—Progress Toward our Vision

You may recall that our Vision Statement divides our mission into 3 different focus areas.

One of those areas involves the use of our facilities and resources. How does our use of our resources reflect the fact that we are concerned with all God's people and not just ourselves?

The Church Board approved a step in that direction in its March 2018 Meeting. We have decided to move some money currently in our checking account (drawing no interest) into an investment at the Christian Church Foundation. The funds being moved include some of the remaining money left from the sale of the parsonage and some others funds remaining from a Youth Fund from a few years ago.

The total investment will amount to \$33,017. By investing with a foundation associated with the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ), we strengthen our connections with our denomination and help build the foundation's own strength. The funds will remain completely at our disposal if we need them in the future. But in the meantime they will generate 3 to 4% annually.

It is our intention to designate those funds earned on this investment for future mission giving. So each year when we receive the investment income we may send some to Week of Compassion, or Christian Theological Seminary's scholarship fund, or use it for some other specific ministry that serves God's people beyond our doors.

This allows us to increase the difference we can make in the world without adding to our budget expenses. We can point to that investment and the use of the proceeds as evidence of our commitment to serve ALL. Meanwhile, we still retain some of the funds from the sale of the parsonage in the checking account to meet other future needs.

A second focus area includes our connections within the community. We are making progress there as well with the ongoing work to develop our Recovery Central. Our Recovery Minister, Dan Sherar, has been sharing our vision with other congregation's leaders and other community organizations as we begin to build a coalition to address the unmet needs of people in recovery or those who have not yet sought the help they need.

We are also making progress in setting up an office with a separate phone line so we will be able to receive calls from those in need of information or support. Part of our vision will be to simply serve as a resource center for people who need information on addiction or who are looking for help getting started on a recovery plan. We will also provide information for those trying to rebuild their lives to help them find other necessary resources. So if they need help with clothes, we might refer them to Westminster Presbyterian. If they need food, we can help them find a meal or a food pantry. If they need help with rent or bills we can help them contact Connections. If they need counseling or a support group, we can help them with that as well.

It's a slow process but there is an openness and eagerness growing within our congregation and the community. Many people recognize that more has to be done. If we can help those who want to offer support to recovering persons simply find some ways to build a cooperative effort, then we will truly make a difference in our community. Progress!! It's a sign of God at work!

NEWS FROM RECOVERY CENTRAL

Much has happened in the last few weeks. Our leadership team held its first meeting on Saturday February 24th. The team includes Alan and Sally Christie, John Dunn, Larry Mattes, Dan Renneker, and Daniel Sherar. Discussion has been focused on the needed structure which is being established with an anticipated phone line for the resource center, volunteers to help staff, and information to be readily available for people in need. In addition to this, we have submitted a grant application to the Center for Congregations. Other grant possibilities are in the works. We can see the potential for working relationships with neighboring congregations, the hospital, schools, government agencies, and other organizations. We look forward to having a new service in the community for people who need better connections to resources and friends who are willing to help with recovery needs.

While we are awaiting a new phone line for Recovery Central, do feel free to bring questions or concerns to our attention. As we begin to meet needs, we gain insights into the issues that are most troublesome for people with addictions and their families. Our aim is not to reinvent the wheel, but to facilitate better collaboration between members of our local community, and increase our understanding and responsiveness to people who have not yet found hope in their struggles with life's hurts, habits and hang-ups.
